## S. B. H. S. Has Hard Task Defeating Gary

### Steel City Men Hold Tan and Blue to 13 to 0—Sullivan is Hero.

One of the best games that will probably be seen on the local grid-iron this year was played at Springbrook Park last Saturday afternoon, when South Bend defeated Gary by a score of 13 to 0.

In view of the fact that South Bend usually defeats teams by scores mounting close to the half century mark, it is plainly evident that the game was stubbornly contested.

The game was played on a wet ground, dotted near the side lines with puddles of water, almost as bad as the Elkhart game last year. Rain fell quite hard for a short time before the contest and during play, and had a decided effect in keeping the crowd reduced, hardly 200 persons witnessing the game.

Many who saw the game say if Gary could have shifted from line bucks to end runs, she would have defeated the locals. The line bucking of her backfield was wonderful and time and again during the second and third quarters, first down was scored through the line. On defense she was also superior to the locals, especially in the line and many times the local plays were stopped before they had a chance to get started by Gary's breaking through.

While Gary outplayed the Tan and Blue, in the line, the locals corralled the Gary "angora," when it came to backfield work and passing. Scott and Boswell were consistent ground gainers for the locals when skirting the ends while "Doc" also made good gains through the line. Wolf, however did most of the line plunging and seldom failed to gain.

Both scores of the locals were made on passes. The first came within a minute and a half of play and gave an impression that Gary would be easy. Sullivan played out for five or six plays before the quarterback saw him; he then grabbed a throw from Scott and sprinted 40 yards for the score. Scott missed the goal. Not until the middle of the last quarter was the local team able to score again. Garfield executed a pretty pass to "Dash" Sullivan and "Dash" dashed 30 yards for the clinching touchdown. Scott kicked the goal, and made the count 13 to 0.

Capt. Phillips at quarter for the visitors was the star of his aggre-

gation. He ran the team in fast and snappy style and was the most consistent ground gainer the visitors had. Harris, at left half, executed most of the passing for Gary and acquitted himself excellently. Phillips was removed from the game in the fourth quarter, suffering from an injured side, which had been hurt during the first game of the year. Knisely sustained an injured leg, and was also removed. Neither injury was serious.

Capt. Whiteman, Hagerty, Nelson and Elbel played the best games for the local linemen, while Scott, Boswell and Wolf, shone brilliantly for the backfield. Sullivan captured all the honors coming to the end men.

Say! garter snakes are funny things

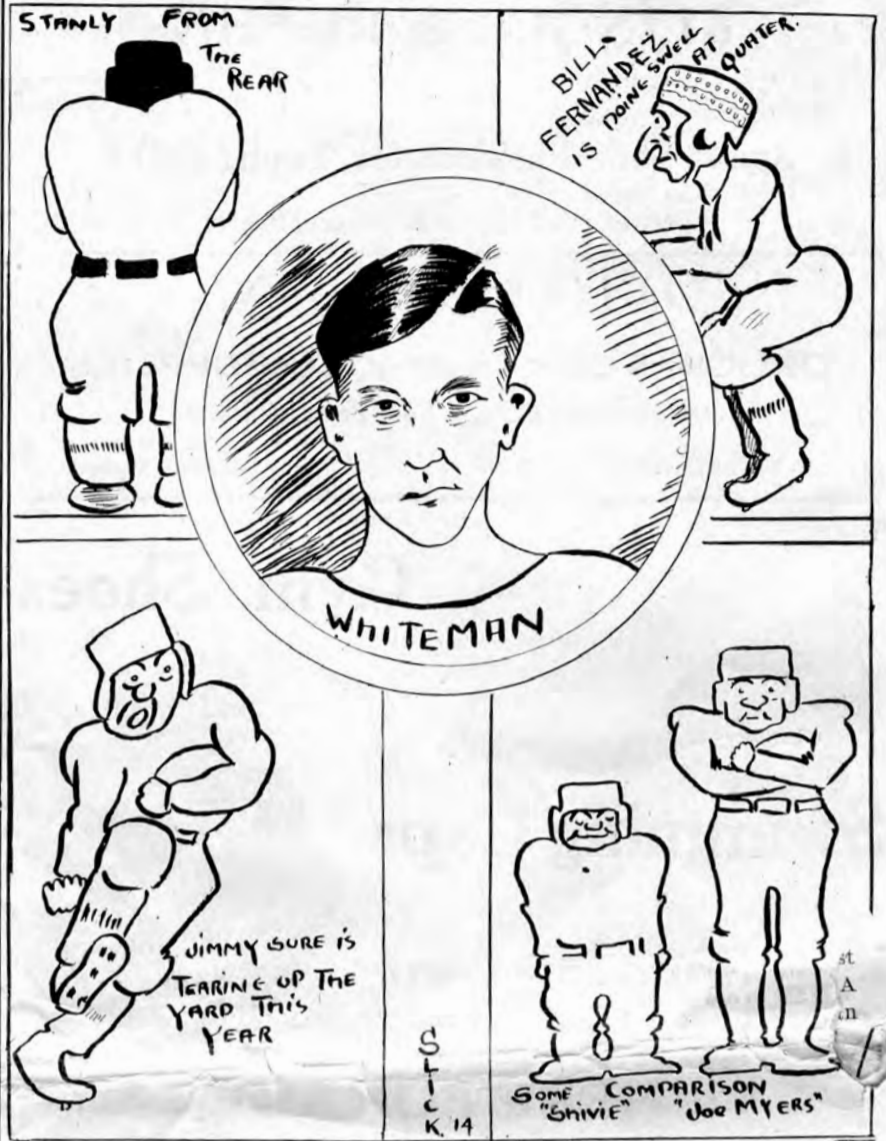

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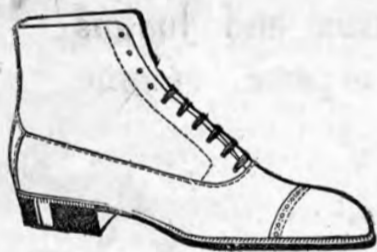
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
