Playing in hard luck the entiregame, the Seniors lost their first battle in the interclass football tournament, to the Juniors, Wednesday afternoon at Leeper field. When the totals were in, the third year men were leading by a score of 13 to 6.

A freak play caused the downfall of the fourth year class. Near the start of the second half, Slick intercepted a forward pass on the Senior three yard, started to run before he had fairly caught the ball, dropped it and then kicked it across the line. Sweeney fell on it and the referee alolwed a touchdown, claiming a free fumble.

Capt. Engdahl of the Juniors scored the other touchdown, for his team, when he caught a pass on the Senior goal line and fell down putting the ball over.

Wills, made the only Senior touchdown in the same way, but pulled off a 20 yard run before he reached the goal line. Slick of the Seniors, made gains around end, while Mueller was a good gainer on forward passes. Garfield and Gower played steady games at the center of the line.

Sweeney of the Juniors was the most consistent ground gainer for his team, and was aided by Engdahl, Strang and Webster, all of whom played good games. The lineups:

Michiganders Have Strong Team and Will Try For Honors Saturday.

With one of the hardest teams on the schedule billed for Saturday, Coach Metzler has been sending the squad through long and hard drills at Leeper Field this week.

The cause of all this work and worry on the part of the coach is Dowagiac. This will be the first time that the two schools have hooked up in a gridiron contest, and they will be out for blood.

The visitors come determined to capture the scalps of the locals, in football, as they have annexed them for the last three years in baseball. The Indians will visit us with a team of husky warriors and promise to surround us and scalp us.

We may judge their prowess by the fact that they defeated St. Joe by a score of 13 to 6, the St. Joe touchdown being made on a fluke. This puts them on the same footing with South Bend in comparative scores, although they will probably outweigh the locals.

If, however, all the men on the squad are in condition, we should anticipate no difficulty in whipping the Indians.

"Jasbo" Boswell has been laid up for the last two weeks with a badly bruised hip and was only able to play a few minutes of the Goshen game.

Ray Nelson and Don Lower are both out on account of bad ankles. The men were injured in the Elkhart battle and were not sent in against Goshen.

"Jimmie" Wolf was out of scrimmage the major share of the time on account of a badly injured knee. It did not prevent him from ripping up the Goshen line, however. "Bachel" Stanley has not been used much in scrimmage owing to an injured hand and a "charley horse."

With these men back in condition Coach Metzler will be able to put his strongest line up in the field. Goshen Furnishes Tame Opposition Locals Have no Trouble Winning From Old Time Rivals-30 to 3.

Just to show Goshen that her dreams of a championship were built like an air castle. South Bend made the journey to the neighboring city last Saturday and knocked the foundations from under the structure by 30 shots to 3.

The Goshenites fought hard by lying down and taking time out after every other play. This prevented the locals from pulling off any of their "chain lightning" plays and kept the score down low.

"Krupp Gun" Scott was the chief battery launched against Goshen. The "Blonde" was in mid-season form and until the fourth quarter was the only man to score for the Tan and Blue. Up to the fourth quarter, Scott had made 16 points for South Bend. He contributed two touchdowns, one goal and one drop kick.

Not only this, but made a sensational 90 yard run for a touchdown, after intercepting a pass on South Bend's ten yard line.

Garfield duplicated Scott's feat in the fourth quarter, and traversed 80 yards for a touchdown but was called back when Scott was accused of assisting him. He was allowed to make another score after a few minutes' delay however, when he shot over the goal for a fake place kick.

Quarterback Kirkpatrick was the star of the Goshenites and scored their only points by a pretty drop kick in the second quarter.

Capt. Whiteman, Hagerty, Stanley and Sullivan shonebest of the linemen, Sullivan was there with his weekly touchdown. Whiteman was shifted to end during the fourth quarter and played a good game. He was prevented from catching a perfect pass, which would have been good for a touchdown, when he tripped over a rise of ground.
