Kertis and Klemczewski did the scoring for the Panthers, the former contributing twice.

Central showed possibilities once in the second quarter when Radecki's pass to Bennett was good for 25 yards. Then again in the second quarter the Bears started on their own fifteen-yard line and got down to the 45-yard line only to be halted by the gun ending the half.

The Panthers scored in each of the last three quarters to chalk up nineteen points altogether and to shut-out the Bears. Central is now on the 50% mark in conference standing, having won two weeks ago from John Adams.
