Crowd Expected at Notre Dame Saturday for 30th in Local Series

QUEEN TO BE CROWNED AT LEEPER BONFIRE.

When Saturday afternoon rolls around out Notre Dame way 25,000 fans will witness the 30th meeting between Central's Bears and the Mishawaka Cavemen.

In these past 29 encounters dating back to 1902 Central has captured glory eighteen times to Mishawaka's seven. However, when that O. K. whistle blows Saturday, the past will be long forgotten for it takes more than an unbalanced record to send Mishawaka home defeated.

To date the Cavemen have a record of two wins against three losses. These wins were over Wabash 20-0 and Goshen 13-0 and the losses were to North Side Ft. Wayne 14-18, Washington of South Bend 13-0, and Elkhart 14-0. Their conference record shows one win against two losses. Although this record is not the best, Coach Russell Arndt stated that his team would be in fine shape Saturday and out fighting for victory over the mighty Bears.

Central's books show a record of five wins against one defeat in six starts. These wins were over Washington of East Chicago, John Adams of outh Bend, Dayton, Ohio, Reitz Memorial of Evansville, and Michigan City, suffering defeat only from Washington of South Bend. In the conference standing the Bears rate two wins against one loss.

Strong Mishawaka Line

Coach Arndt is relying very much on his forward wall which is rated as one of the best in the conference. Representing this machine are: L. Smith and Gorney, ends; Lugaressi and Potts, tackles; Houghton and Orata, guards; and De Volder at Center. Behind the line will be Trittipio at the quarter spot, De Vreesh and Umbaugh at the halves, and Miller at fullback. With an excellent line and four triple-threat backs to handle the pigskin the Cavemen boast great chances in recovering the lost Hickory Stick.

In the forward forces for the Bears there will be Harvey and Lash at ends; Copeland and Grabarak at tackle; Brillain and Manuszak at guard; and Southworth at center. Right on their heels will be Rotzoll at quarter, Bennitt and Flowers at the half back positions, and Capt. Rusk at full. The kick-off is scheduled for 2 p. m. with the following line-ups taking the field:

The Bears added another conference win to their books last Friday night in defeating Michigan City 7-0 at Michigan City. This makes a total of two wins against one loss in Central's conference standing.

Captain Rusk, Central's able signal caller, led the team in the triumph by scoring the touchdown and picking up most of the yardage for the Bears.
