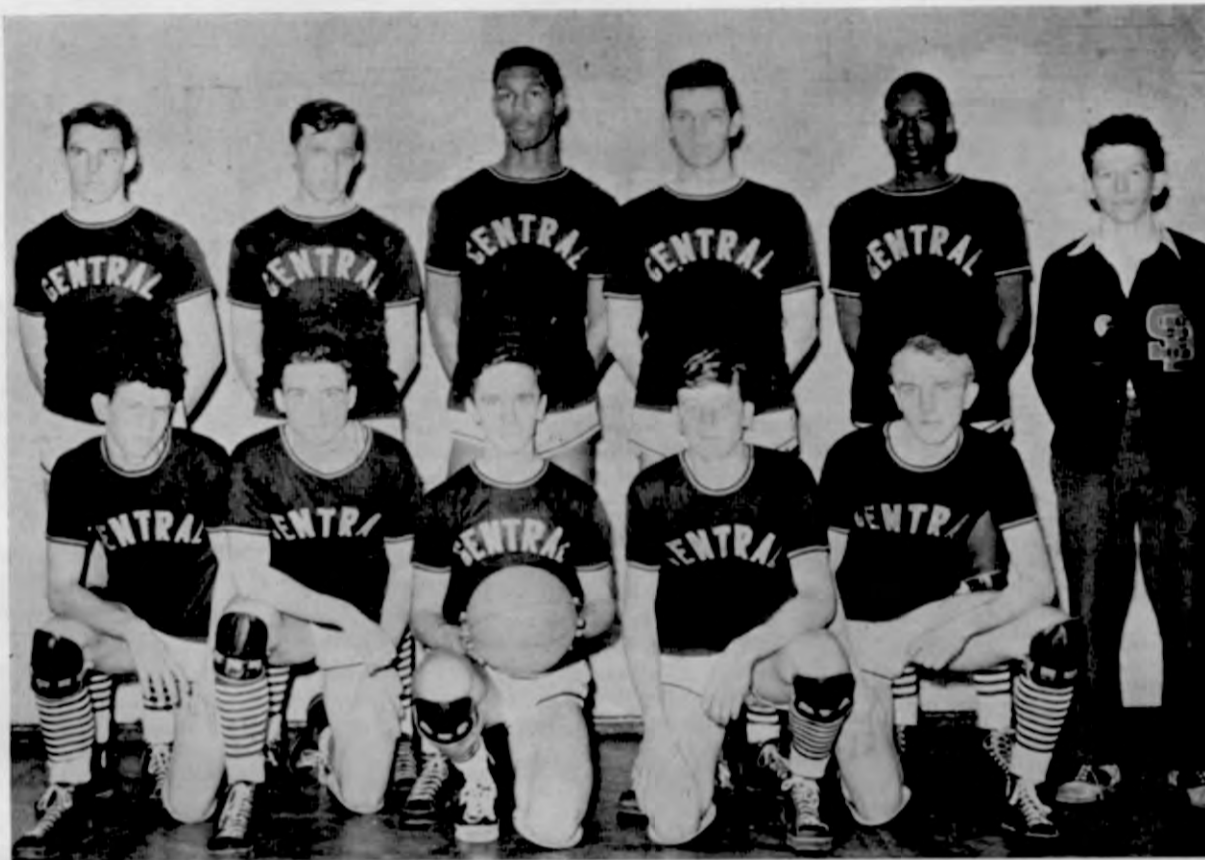
Highest honors go to George Yack, second string center, who boasted three A's and one B. The average for all twenty-two lettermen was 85 which is a B—.

FILMLAND SOUND ACE GIVES DEMONSTRATION

Count Cutelli, "Hollywood's chief wizard of sound," demonstrated sound effects in a half hour of highly educational entertainment this morning.

He gave an introduction and explanation of mechanical sound production, its source and application. Count Cutelli demonstrated the following sound effects: an ordinary train, giving different speeds, express train, giving different speeds, special sounds of diner and Pullman cars, airplane bomber, in action, dropping a bomb, with sound of explosion, modern ocean liner with three standard speeds, and sound of engines in engine room, football, horse hoofs, covered wagon on the road, fire crackling, explosion of coal gas in mine, motorboat, footsteps, quiet river, diving, swimming, artillery, iceberg cracking and falling, mountain slide, avalanche, hurricane, and imitations of animals and songs.

BEARS VICTORS IN TWO;

LOSE TO KOKOMO 27-23
Coach Wooden's basketball team came out on top in the way of wins and losses throughout last week in winning two out of three games. On Tuesday, they defeated New Carlisle, 29-23, there; they played at home on Friday when they walloped Lebanon, 41-25, in the John Adams gym; and on the following day, Saturday, they traveled down to Kokomo, where they met their lone defeat. The score was 27-23 in favor of the Tigers.

Powell High Scorer

Captain Parson Howell led the Bears against New Carlisle in scoring the majority of the team's points. He slipped in seven from the floor and two from the gift line to total sixteen points. The Tigers were leading the South Benders, 12-11 at the half, but fell before the Bear's second half surge and finished on the losing end of a 29-23 final score.

On Friday the Bears made it two in a row in defeating Lebanon High School of Lebanon, Indiana, 41-25. Bob Smith and Bill Moore captured scoring honors, each getting ten points. Bill got three field goals and four fouls while Bob slipped in four from the floor and got two from charity line.

The Bears showed excellent fundamental mastery in out-passing the Boone County boys considerably. The local boys led at the half, 29-11, and held the down-staters to but fourteen points in the last half, while they added twelve to make the score 41-25 in their favor.

Kokomo Overtakes Bears

On Saturday the Bears met stiff opposition in their host, Kokomo, who defeated them, 27-23 before 2,800 fans. The teams left the floor at half-time and the Tigers led 19-13. The Bears came back in the third stanza to score ten points to Kokomo's two, taking over the lead, 23-21, into the final period. Central, however, failed to score in the final quarter due to inability to connect from the floor and the Tigers passed the Bears scoring six points in the last two minutes to decide the outcome which was a 27-23 count in favor of the Tigers.

On the honorable mention list five Bruins received consideration; Alex Lash and Val Jablonski, ends; Al Grabarek a tackle; and Harry Bennitt and Gene Flowers, backs.

Central placed two men on the South Bend Tribune's Fifth annual All Twin-City Football Team. These were Clyde Rusk, a fullback, and Irwin Southworth, a center. The mythical team is coached by Bernie Witucki, whose team represented the Eastern Division in the annual N. I. H. S. C. playoff against Lew Wallace of Gary. Southworth gained his honor through his fine defensive play especially in his backing up of the line. He played his most outstanding game against Washington of South Bend, doing the major share of the tackling. Rusk received his recognition through his power in going through the line. His outstanding games were against Reitz Memorial of Evansville and Michigan City,

whom he defeated almost single-handed. Walter Copeland and Al Grabarek made the second team in their respective positions; guard and tackle. Those receiving honorable mention for Central were Alex Lash, an end; Bill Brillan, a guard; Harry Bennitt, a back, and Gene Flowers, also a back.
