

#### CENTRAL WELCOMES NO. SIDE TO N. I. H. S. C. CIRCLE

The Central Bears came out on top in their initial conference game of the season as they turned back North Side of Ft. Wayne 40-26 at the "Y" gym last Friday night. The Bruins held the lead throughout the game.

The first quarter reports showed Central in the lead 12-6 and they again showed favor to the locals at half-time when the Bears led 25-10. The Redskins failed to threaten in the second half while the Bears finished the third quarter still in the lead 30-17 and then went on to outscore the visitors in the final stanza 10-9 to finish with a grand total of 40 points to Ft. Wayne's 26.

Capt. Parson Howell of the Bruins captured scoring honors for the evening ,throwing in five from the floor and six from the gift line to total sixteen points. 


