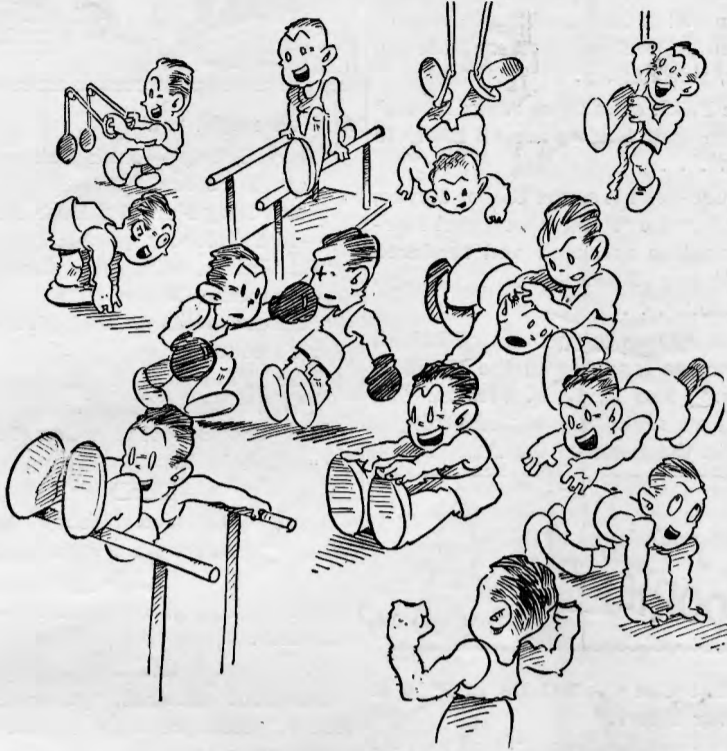

The Senators of Washington East Chicago treated their Central guests quite oddly by giving them a 13-7 defeat last Friday.

They pulled out their prize good luck charms and a few unorthodox football tactics to shove the Bruins off the shelf. Passing on the fourth down to the benefit of a touchdown is a fine example of the foregoing point. The Bears were mentally shaken up several times due to tricky plays emphatically used by the East Chicagoans.

Central's deserved score was executed by way of a pass from Deranek to Flowers and a conversion by King late in the last quarter. The East Chicago gang scored on a lengthy slash over the right side of the line made by Washington's half-back, Jones. Later in the final period the Red-draped team crossed the pay line again, this time on a pass from Murakowski to Michaels.

Deranek and Flowers both played beautiful ball all during the game. This pair caused numerous headaches to the Senators before the final gun.
