## REVIEWING REQUIRED FOR THOSE WHO FAIL TEST.

The Stanford Advanced Mathematics Achievement Tests which were originally scheduled for last Monday but were delayed until Wednesday or possibly later, due to the non-arrival of the test sheets, will determine whether Central students need more fundamental mathematics or not. The tests are taken by all 12B's, all 12A's who stay over, and by all students seventeen years of age by January 1.

Both boys and girls must make a score of 78 or better on the test or they will be required to take a Refresher Course in Math for two hours a week next semester. According to Mr. Wilson Thornton, head of the mathematics and science departments, the course will be largely arithmetic supplemented by interesting problems taken from modern war application.

Mr. Thornton hopes to include basic principles of the slide rule, logarithms, and easy numerical trigonometry. The drill in fundamentals should be interesting enough so that every student will be glad he took the course. The Stanford Tests which are standardized achievement ratings are given by the Guidance Department and consist of sections on reasoning and computing.

The work-book which also serves as a text is *Arithmetic for the Emergency*, by Ruen, Knight, and Studebaker, the latter being at the present time the progressive U. S. Commissioner of Education. The book which costs 30 cents is published by Scott, Foresman and Company and is the only material which must be purchased by the student.

Physically fit—what do these words mean to you? Do you shrink when you hear someone say them, because you cannot reach the high standards that are required?

The present war has set up some very high standards concerning physical fitness. These had to be set up, because the modern way of warfare requires it. Pilots need good eyesight, steady nerves, good coordination and many others. The same goes for the other branches of the armed forces. It takes all of those elements in order to fly a plane that travels three hundred miles an hour or to shoot a gun that fires a thousand shots a minute.

Physical fitness is one of the motives that ties up with strong minds and spirits. These things work together as a "team" which has to be in everyone who is serving in the war effort in order to create a winning force.

The average man in the armed forces can do but two or three "chins" or five or six "pushups". This is set as a requirement for the physical test that is given to military men. A gent in one of the pre-flight schools can do four hundred and ninety-five pushups (do I hear moans from the boys in gym class?) This is a very good record.

All of this jabber sums up to the fact that everybody who is taking gym at Central should go at it wholeheartedly in order to build himself or herself up for those tough days that probably lie ahead.

Some of the boys who are skipping these classes are going to be quite surprised when they find out that they can only do one "chin" or but two "pushups" before an Army examiner.

Some of the ex-Central students who are in the armed forces say that they are learning to appreciate physical fitness. Their first few weeks of training included a few fifty-mile hikes in the dead of night, rain or "moonshine" and calisthenics several hours every day.
