CENTRAL GIRLS IMPROVE IN PHY. ED. TESTS

To all girls who took gym a series of agility tests were given at the first of last semester, without any practice at all, and again at the end of the semester to show what improvements had been made. The series consisted of six tests: Jump and Reach, Balance, Sit-Ups, Basket Shooting, Agility Run, and Baseball Target Throws.

In all 415 girls took all tests both times. There was an improvement of 54% in the jump and reach, 39% improved in balance, 82% improved in sit-ups, 40% improved in basket shooting, 51% improved in the agility run, and 35% improved in the baseball target throw.


TURNING A NEW LEAF

BEARS TROUNCE CAVEMEN AND TAKE LEAGUE LEAD


