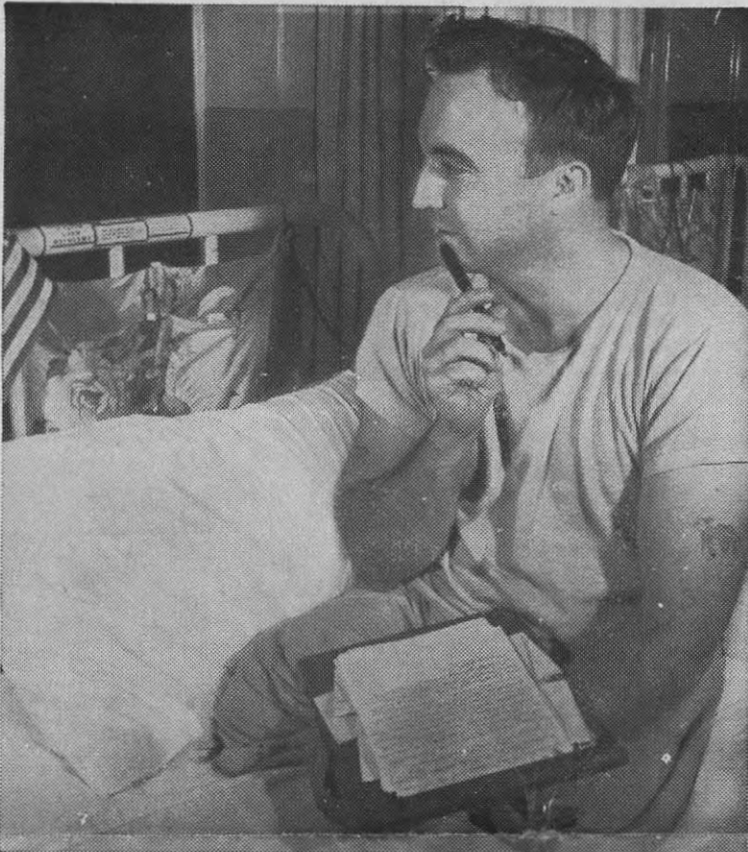
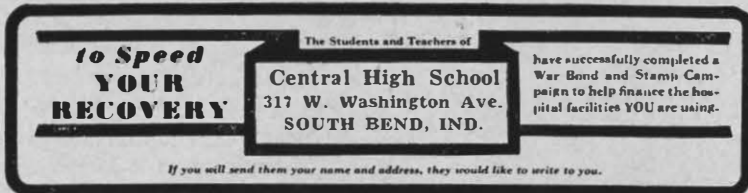

BEARS-ADAMS FRIDAY

This Friday night will find Coach Johnny Wooden's quintet battling it out with Coach Ralph Powell's Adams Eagles in a N. I. H. S. C. contest on the latter's floor. Then on the following Tuesday the Bears will leave town and go to Lafayette where they will play Jefferson high.

Both of these games spell work for the Bears. The Adams contest will be the easier of the two, but those Eagles are not to be underestimated. The Adams record is not much to look at so far (they have lost their last five games), but boys such as Bob Nitz and Frank Wulf, starting forwards, Dick Fohrer, center, and Glenn Personette and Don Howell still make the team plenty potent. Nitz, Wulf, and Fohrer are all over six feet tall, while Personette and Howell are five-11 and five-10 respectively.

Jefferson is one of the best teams in the state. They beat Bosse by some 20 points in a great upset and they also smothered Frankfort. Coach Wooden thinks it will be the toughest game in our schedule. On the other hand Central has her good boys. Bob Adams and Gene Ring look plenty good and Jerome Perkins gets better every game he plays. The main reason for the Bears' last four losses is probably the change in coaches. Mr. Wooden does not know the boys yet and the boys do not know him, but after a couple more games they should understand each other a lot more, and then things should run along smoothly.

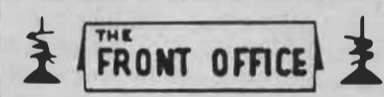

BEARS DROP TWO MORE BY CLOSE SCORES

Coach Johnny Wooden's hardwooders spent another unhappy week-end, as they were downed by a local and out-of-town team. Riley overpowered the Bears 41-38 in a non-conference battle last Thursday, and N. S. Fort Wayne came to our city and defeated the Bruins 40-38 in a nip-an-tuck thriller.

Riley took a first period lead by a score of 10-8. In the second quarter, Bob Adams, the Bears high-point man was laying them in right and left and when the half came the Bears led 21-16. Riley snapped back in the third quarter and led 33-29. The Wildcats kept the lead and the game ended up with the Cats on top 41-38.

Saturday the Bears were outclassed again. Norb Cowan helped the North Side objective by dumping in 18 points. Eugene Ring was the Bears' main story. The Bruins never were in the lead at the end of a quarter, but they did keep pretty close to the Redskins. The fourth quarter had all the fans on their feet. The score was tied at 34-34 and an exchange of buckets put in at 36-36. Charity throws by Ring and Ed McCarthy ended the Bears' scoring. Fort Wayne hit another one from the court and two more points were added from the charity stripe to put the game on ice. When the gun sounded North Side was ahead 40-38.

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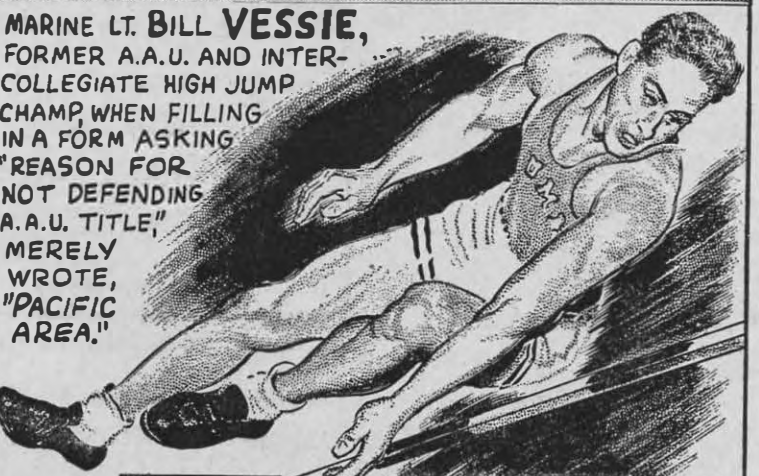

The natatorium has been closed temporarily and Coach Elbel is in a spot as to where the Bears will entertain. The school pool is rather small, leaving the Y pool as the only remaining choice, and at present the Y diving board is rather NG. Meets have been scheduled with Horace Mann and Froebel and competition against Hammond, Whiting, Lew Wallace and East Chicago Washington is also in the offing.



The Bruin tank squad should be a much stronger aggregation than last year as they are bolstered by six returning lettermen and several new swimmers who look good in practice. Jim Makielski and Richard Day are the likely starters in the grueling 220-yard free style. Diving is also undecided but Mitchell will surely be the first man and either Parshall, Spears, or Cooper as second.
