Baccalaureate



The commencement exercises will be held in Adams Auditorium at 8:00 P. M. Wednesday, May 29. Dr. Charles W. Gilkey, dean of the University of Chicago's chapel, will speak on the subject, "How Long Will Cut Flowers Last." The commencement exercises will feature songs by the Glee Club and addresses by class president Joe Hickey, valedictorian Andrew Swanson, and salutatorian Mina Jean Miller. Rev. Frank E. Davison will pronounce the invocation.

X-RAY TESTS SHOW EXPOSURES TO T. B.

Miss Fern Watts, school nurse, has announced the results of the T. B. and X-ray tests taken by the ninth and eleventh grade pupils recently. Out of 602 students eligible to take the T. B. tests, 287 did so. Of this number 245 tests proved negative while the remaining forty-two were positive. Positive reactions mean that the germs are in the body but not necessarily active. In the X-ray tests 741 students were examined. 201 of this number were shown to have had healed infections.



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
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TO SKIP OR NOT TO SKIP
