1687 In School Friday

The total enrollment at Central this year reached a total of 1,603 students on Sept. 3. Last Friday the number reach 1,687. There were 372 seniors and 506 sophomores enrolled on this latter date. There are now, for the first time in several years, more boys than girls enrolled. Boys exceed the girls by 47. Last year's enrollment at the corresponding period was only 1,619.

Glee Club Plans Busy Season

Central's Glee Club has already begun this year and is looking forward to a season packed full of activities. At least fourteen programs are on the schedule for the coming year which the Glee Club will assist in or will present. Activities the Glee Club will participate in during October are the Revue and the North Central Indiana Teachers' Conference at the end of the month. The fifth hour chorus has been started and is open to anyone. New voices, and especially male voices are still needed in this fifth hour group and also in the Glee Club.

Extension Plans For Fall

With the closing of the summer session of the Indiana Extension, which had an enrollment of 250, plans are now being made for the fall semester which begins on September 9. Seven hundred fifty students are expected to attend the extension classes this fall, which will make the largest enrollment ever had by the extension school. Causes for the large increase in attendance are due to the fact that more students are seeking a higher education and the housing shortage at Indiana University and Purdue are acute thus making it necessary for many to carry on their college work at home.


And so the first day goes. By the end of June, this is what we hear:

Central Defeats East Chicago 26-12

Coach Bob Jones watched his Central Bears play both good and bad ball last Friday night, but emerge from the season opener with a 26-12 triumph over the East Chicago Washington Senators on the East Chicago Roosevelt field. This was the first Bear game Jones had coached since 1940 when he went to the army, but last Friday proved that Jones had not lost any of his coaching technique while in the army.

The starting line-up hailed eight returning lettermen who for the first half of the game pushed the Senators all over the field, rolling up 100 yards along the ground and 88 through the air along with two touchdowns making the score at the end of the half 14-0. "Posey" Flowers' passes to Gene Ring were excellent while little Jerome Perkins sneaked his way through gaping holes for sizable gains.

But in the second half the tables turned and the Senators were out to get revenge, but the Bears proved able opportunists and softened the East Chicago attack by intercepting two passes in the fourth quarter. Al Daoust snatched the first one to click off 69 yards for a T. D. and three plays later Ervin Zalas picked the ball out of the air to dash 32 yards for a field goal, making the final score 26-12.



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
