Courses Offered Boys

Boys who are uncertain of the prospects of finishing high school are being provided with a new opportunity to equip themselves with practical information that will aid them when they leave school, whether it is after their first and second year of high school or whether they decide to complete high school.

"A supplementary course has been started to meet the needs that have not been met before for a group of boys in high school around the ages of 15-16. The need of such a program has been made apparent by the large number of ninth and tenth grade students who withdraw from school every quarter. Many causes have been placed on the list to explain the reasons for all these withdrawals. Home difficulties, mental instability, and the dislike for the regular academic work are the main causes," Principal P. D. Pointer commented.

Central has outlined a program by which these groups of students will take practical knowledge courses during their first high school years. Since it is a known fact that most people of this age enjoy handicrafts and work done with their hands, the main part of the program will consist of shop courses. During the first year or two, the student will be enjoying the work and possibly making up his mind as to whether he cares to stay in school or not. If the boy does decide to complete his high school course, he will be put in the regular academic courses to meet the requirements of graduation and he will also receive credit for all the work completed while taking the supplementary course.

Thirty boys from the four city high schools will begin the program this semester. Mr. E. E. Barnbrook will direct the boys in shop for three hours each day. An improvement English course and gym work will compose the rest of the daily schedule. If the course proves satisfactory in its aims, a similar program for girls will be arranged.

An explanatory course in radio presentation will be given at the fifth lecture. 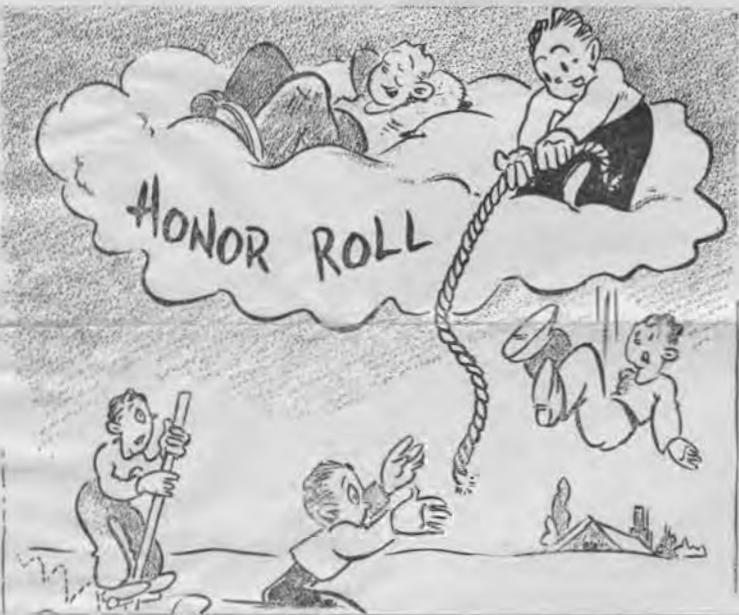

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Bears Face Red Devils In Prison City Tonite

Central's basketball squad, currently leading the pack in the eastern division Northern Indiana conference race, is slated to put its perfect record on the line twice this week. The Bruins, sporting a string of five consecutive league victories, travel to Michigan City tonight, and then on Saturday the Bears will meet Washington's Panthers in the John Adams gymnasium.

The Red Devils, who haven't lost a game on their home floor this season, have a conference record of one win and three losses. They bested Nappanee, 56-43, for their lone league win. Losses have been to Washington, Elkhart, and John Adams. Outside the conference, however, the City boys have won seven games and dropped but one.

Leading the Michigan City offense is their center, big Bob Ciolek, who ran up twenty points in his last outing, against Nappanee. Rounding out the starting five are Dan Nespo and Paul Petroff, forwards, and Larry Molen and Jim Chamness, guards.

Washington, which has started slowly this season, is rounding into shape, and looks like a sizeable foe, if they get started clicking. The Panthers have "had their moments" this year, such as when they scored 40 points in the last half of their game with Washington-Clay, this year's county champs.

Starting the game for Washington will be Jerome Goralczyk and Norm Woltman at the forwards; "Junebug" Alexander at center; and Bob Fenimore and Bob Robertson at guards. All but Goralczyk are regulars from last year.

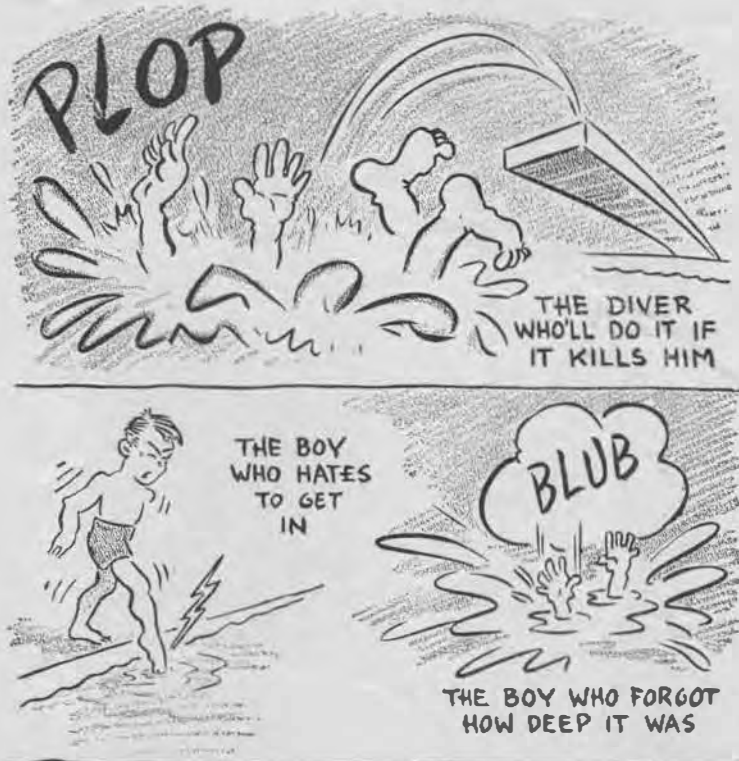
Perfect Conference Record
