## BEARS BATTLE DEVILS TOMORROW NIGHT

In the past years the Michigan City vs. Central games have proved very eventful. Take for example the 1943 game, played at M. C. on an extremely muddy field. Here it was Dick Deraneks 95 yard sprint for a T. D. and Dan Walkowski's tackling of an Imp behind the M. C. goal that won the game for the Bruins, 9-7. In '44 and '45 the Orange and Blue met and conquered the Big Red twice. Centrals push in these two tussles was supplied by such fine men as Deranek, Flowers, Roytek, White and Morrical. Score in '44 was 28-12, and in '45 Coach Crowe's team won 40-6 from polio- troubled Michigan City.

Last year Central again ran roughshod over Coach Del Miller's eleven. The Bears just never stopped rolling and by the time the final gun sound-

ed, Central had racked up 31 points to M. C.'s 0.

This year the Imps just haven't settled down to playing the brand of football that they are capable of exhibiting. They are loaded with talent and have several first string men back from last year's squad. Michigan City's play is built around Ciolek, Mathias and White who act at full-back, quarterback and halfback respectively. Ciolek has ben bothered by an injured knee this season, but still this hasn't stopped him from playing brilliant ball. The Red Devils have a young, but large line. This boy, Deutscher, looks like something out of the Notre Dame line-up.

If Michigan City happens to be hot next Friday night, you can be sure Central will have her hands full.

**Bears-Schurz Battle To 13-13 Deadlock**

The Central Bears, fighting the hazards involved in 60 minutes of struggling with a bruising, fast and versatile Schurz of Chicago eleven, emerged after a feverish fourth quarter with a 13-13 tie, before 5,000 hysterical fans at School Field last Friday evening.

Central scoreless and behind, 13-0, gong into the fourth quarter, roared back into the ball game with a relentless aerial attack that stunned the visiting Chicago fans. This passing exhibition was featured by the accurate passing arm or Left Half-back Wayman Redding.

Central's first touchdown march which netted 93 yards, was set off by guard Roland Solander, who recovered a Schurz fumble, and was ended with a brilliant pass from Wayman Redding to Bob Wisniewski. This drive was featured by runs and passes of Redding, brilliant receptions by Bond, Neeser, and Wisniewski, and by the line bucking of Louie Batalis.

**Schurz Expecting Fumble**

Central's second tally was set up by Schurz electing to kickoff to the Bears after the first Central score.

Louis Batalis returned the Schurz conversion to the Central 36. Here Redding's pass to Wisniewski was good for 16 yards and a first down. Wisniewski was injured on this play and was replaced by Al Spriggs. After a few short gaining running plays, Redding again reared back and tossed another touchdown pass to Spriggs, who had sneaked through the Schurz secondary defense, tying the score 13-13.

Schurz displayed great power on the ground through their elusive, fast breaking T-formation, as well as having a formidable passing attack.

In the second quarter Pedit's pass to Gerlinger set up Schurz's first touchdown.

Chicago scored its second touchdown in the third period. From the Central 36 yard line, Pionke threw a flanker pass to Pedit who jaunted over for the second Schurz score.

All men and women, sixteen years of age or over with handicaps in the form of mental or physical injuries, are eligible for the public service performed by the state to preserve and restore the ability to work for pay. This includes World War I and World War II veterans, civil service employees, merchant seamen, and all civilians.

Anyone interested in these services may go to room 17 in the Central Junior building where they may secure literature concerning the subject or answers to questions.

Briefly, the following services are provided: Physical examinations; Necessary prosthetic devices such as artificial limbs, hearing aids, trusses, etc.; Necessary medical, surgical, and psychiatric services; individual counseling and guidance; Training for a job—in schools, on the job, by correspondence, or by tutor; Maintenance and transportation during rehabilitation, if necessary; Necessary tools, equipment, and licenses; Placements on the right job; and follow-up to make sure the worker and job are properly matched.
