### \$5,000 Reward Offered

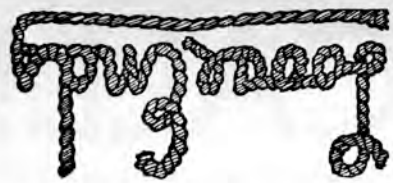

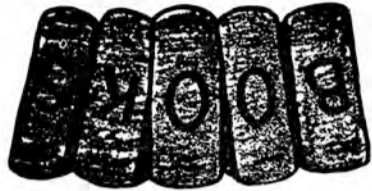
