Centralites Distinguish Alma Mater in Indiana University High School **Achievement Program**

Fifteen Central students went to Indiana University last Saturday to participate in the state contests for Mathematics, English, and Spanish. After the tests, which were held Saturday morning in the I. U. fieldhouse, medals were awarded to nine Central students at the awards assembly.

Florence Rottach won first place in the state and a gold medal in the field of Spanish. In English, Ellen Frank won a gold medal for the second highest score in the state and Judy Mellow won a bronze medal. David Nowacki won fourth place in the state and a silver medal for comprehensive mathematics. Bruce Herring and Tom Hensel also won bronze medals for this same test. In geometry, Richard Dunbar won a bronze medal. Sixth place in the state and a silver medal were awarded to Rita Payton for her work in algebra. Marilyn Brown also won a bronze medal for algebra.

INDIANA AND PURDUE UNIVERSITIES OFFER HIGH SCHOOL DAY AND OPEN HOUSE

The fourth annual Indiana University High School Day will be held May 9, 1953 on the I. U. campus in Bloomington. Juniors and seniors in high school are invited to come to the campus Friday evening for registration in the Union Building between 7:00 and 10:00 p.m. Entertainment will begin at 8:00 p.m. The housing Friday night and two meals Saturday will be complimentary to the students and faculty sponsors. For the second consecutive year, one party won all of the offices for next year's student council in the annual Council elections held April 20-22. The newest party at Central, the Representatives, won by a large majority. The students who will lead the Student Council of Central for next year are: President-John Dunnuck; Vice-president-Bill Nicks; Secretary - Sandy DeVries; and Treasurer-Kathy Wilmore.

During the three days of voting, 647 votes were cast in the senior building and 873 votes were cast by students in the junior building. This total of 1520 was one of the largest turnouts for the elections that Central has had in a number of years, in proportion to the enrollment of students.

The campaigning by the various parties was carried out on a large scale, with the party meetings, name Pioneer tags, and copies of platforms. As a culmination of three days of voting, the Representative Party was announced to be the winner at 4:00 p.m.

A total of approximately 1,500 students competed in the state tests.

Riley Forfeits Make Wash. Lose Crown

Central Beats Riley, 1-0, in Football

Mishawaka's Cavemen stepped on the 1952 Conference (N. I. H. S. C.) football pedastal and Washington reluctantly stepped off. Reason: Last Wednesday Riley Principal Donald A. Dake announced that the Wildcat grid squad under Coach Paul (Spike) Kelly had used an ineligible halfback in seven of last fall's games. The player in question was Dick Weinberg, senior and a veteran of four years who scored 30 points while playing left half for Kelly's variations of the box system. Result: The Wildcats automatically forfeited seven games (of which they had won three and tied one), including their 13-6 league victory over Mishawaka. The forfeit boosted the Maroons past Washington into first place with 5 wins and one tie in six games, to the Panthers' 5 conquests and one defeat. Complications. The Panthers represented the Eastern Division of the N. I. H. S. C. in the title game and lost to John Zitko's E. C. Washington Senators, 26-14. Obviously the playoff game couldn't be called back, but late Wednesday Washington Principal John McNamara relinquished the conference trophy to Gene Dykstra's Cavemen.

WINNING YEAR FOR ROSS

Among the seven games forfeited was the Central-Riley game which the south siders, sparked by Weinberg, won 29-0. The forfeit boosted Ross Stephenson's first year record

to a respectable 5 wins and 4 losses and made it another successful season for the Bears. Other games forfeited by the Wildcats were the Mishawaka contest, a 26-0 victory over Adams, losses to Washington

14-0, Elkhart 21-19, and Evansville Reitz 21-20. It left the "Cats" season standings at 1 win, 8 losses.
