Basket Ball Squad Rounding Into Form

Coach Metzler Will Have Fast Squad—Many Good Men Out for Places.

Despite the fact that all the regulars of the team graduated last year, basket ball fans need have no fear over the prospects of the Tan and Blue squad this year.

This optimism is making itself felt because of the abundance of excellent material which has come out for places. Three or four good men are fighting for every position and Coach Metzler will have a difficult task naming his first choice.

A three or four cornered fight is being waged for forward. Capt. Fernandez will play one of the stations, while Sullivan, Scott and Hagerty are having a pretty tussle for the other position. There is a possibility that Sullivan may also be used at guard as he is displaying some ability when used there during scrimmages. Sousley, Sweeney, Mueller, Zessinger, Bucher and Cochevety are also doing stellar work at the forward job.

The fight for center seems to have resolved itself into a contest between Collmer and Whiteman. Collmer was looked upon as a forward when the season started but he has developed ability at the jump-off which has caused Coach Metzler to give him consideration for that place. Several other good men are also out for this position.

Wolf seems assured of a guard position as he is playing a brand of basket ball that bodes ill for any forward called upon to oppose him. Anderson seems the logical choice as a team mate for "Jimmie" and he has shown more ability at guarding and playing the floor than any of the men out, although Zilky and Sullivan are being given consideration by the coach. Scheibelhut, Elbel and several others are giving him a battle for the place, however, and a shake up is looked for before final selections are made.

Fans, however, may be assured of one of the best teams in the history of the school which will make up in speed what it lacks in weight.

Sectional Tryouts May Be Held Here

Plan of Last Two Years Discarded and South Bend May See Play.

High school students may be treated to the spectacle of 25 or more basket ball teams competing here March 5 and 6 if plans now under way by Coach Metzler are carried to success. Metzler has received a letter from the Indiana State High School Association authorities asking if he can secure a place in South Bend where the tryouts for the northern section in the state basket ball tournament may be held.

Last year and the year before all the teams in the state that wished to participate in the tournament went to Indiana University where in an elimination contest, that was cruel to the players, the winner was decided. As soon as a team lost a game in this tournament they were dropped. This necessitated a constant winning streak for five or six games in two days, the maximum time allowed for the contest.

A strong protest against this plan was made by high schools all over the state, so the association decided that they would divide the state into four sections, and let the teams in each division play for the title in that section. The winners in the four sections will be taken to Indiana University when the semifinals will be played in the morning and the finals in the evening of the same day. This is but a reasonable tax on the endurance of the teams involved. As the sectional elimination-contests need not be played on one day and as they will not require more than two or three in two days, the plan is meeting with decided favor wherever discussed.

Coach Metzler has secured the use of the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium for two dates on which the northern section tryouts will be held, and is waiting for word from the association before securing accommodations for the teams, participating.

An interesting talk based on his practical experience while a traveling salesman was given the Salesmanship class in the Public Speaking department, Friday, Dec. 4, by Mr. Hare.

In his remarks Mr. Hare told the students of certain qualities which must be possessed by salesmen in order to be successful in their line of work.

A practical knowledge of one's line of goods, not only as to selling points but details of construction and cost was insisted upon by the speaker who cited several instances where such information had proven of value to

A knowledge or understanding of one's customer was also dwelt upon by Mr. Hare. A salesman must be able to form an analysis of the man he is trying to sell, as in this way he is often enabled to discover peculiarities and whims of the man by which he may be approached with more success.

High moral standards where also recommended by the speaker as of vital importance to the salesman. Without a high degree of honesty and integrity, one is not able to impress the buyer with the worth of one's line of goods or the ability of one as a salesman.

This talk was but one of several which are being planned for the course as the students find them very helpful in supplementing their class work.

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
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
