## Education Week

The week of November 8-14 is National Education Week, sponsored by The National Education Association, The American Legion, The United States Office of Education, and The National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

American Education Week grew out of the First World War. Twenty-five per cent of the men examined in the draft were illiterate, many were physically unfit, and others had little understanding of the American way of life. During the war, the schools were short of teachers and because of that many were closed.

A long range program for the extension of education was needed to reduce illiteracy and physical unfitness. Members of the American Legion consulted with educators and the first American Education Week was observed in 1921.

The broad purpose of American Education Week has become that of acquainting the people with the needs, aims, and achievements of schools. The schools are playing a vital part in the nation's war effort. The main contribution children can make now is simply to grow into good strong Americans.

## CENTRAL REPRESENTED IN SCIENCE ELECTIONS.

More than one hundred students from fifteen Indiana high schools attended the Indiana Junior Academy of Science held Saturday at the University of Notre Dame.

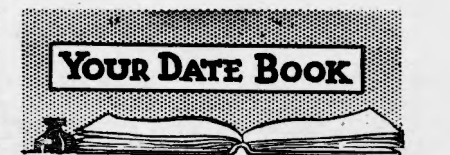

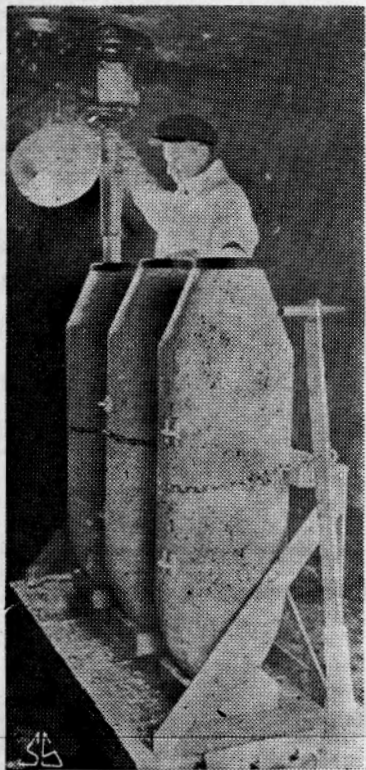

THE LIQUID gushing from the pipe in the photograph above, just like water from a huge faucet, is the powerful explosive, Amatol.

Toluene, raw material for TNT, was derived from coal almost exclusively during the first World War. Now petroleum joins coal as an even richer source. By-product of refining processes is ammonia, which is converted into ammonia nitrate and mixed with TNT to produce the high explosive known as Amatol, much used as a bomb filler.
