#### RESULT OF EYE AND EAR TESTS

Out of 731 students taking the tests, 124 were found to be defective in hearing and 160 in seeing. Sixty-one of the students who had poor hearing were again tested with a pitch test, and thirty of them were definitely found to have ailments of the ears. Those students with bad evesight will be tested in the near future to determine more fully the cause of their poor vision.

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

#### BEARS LOSE HARD FOUGHT CONFERENCE TILT AND 2nd PLACE TO RILEY 13-0

The Riley Wildcats took over undisputed second place in the conference race last Saturday by defeating the Bears 13-0 before a throng of 8,000 fans. Although the statistics show that the game was rather well balanced, one might notice that Central failed to invade Riley territory to any great extent in the first half. The Wildcats simply stopped the Bears in their tracks.

Riley's first score came early in the first period when alert Cat linemen smothered a Central fumble. Ernie Kovatch, Riley's smashing fullback slashed his way through Central's line to hit pay dirt and then made the first score of the first half. The second period was just a matter of see-sawing back and forth with Riley in Central teritory much of the time.

The final Riley tally came in the third quarter when halfback Lou Tompos galloped 48 yards behind some effective blocking and crossed the last marker to make the score 13-0

#### Bog Down on the Six

Central's only effective threat came in the third period when Flowers passed 48 yards to Joe Deranek to the Cats' 11-yard line. Riley then gave the Bears five more yards and an automatic first down because of defensive holding. Flowers tried three passes. Two being incomplete and the third was intercepted by Eufemi and brought back to the 19-yard

The famed Riley line measured up to all expectations and succeeded in blocking two Central kicks and stopped Jerry Morrical practically every time before he had done much dam-

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
