Extension Enrolls 600

Dr. Donald Carmony, executive secretary of the South Bend-Mishawaka center of the Indiana extension division, has announced that approximately six hundred students have enrolled for the spring term, a number which is fifty per cent greater than the enrollment for the spring term last year. Of this number 85 students are veterans, three of these being women. Many students, preparing to enter Indiana or Purdue universities, are planning to take extension work through the spring and summer terms this year. Enrollments in chemistry, mathematics, physics, psychology, and English composition are rather heavy, Dr. Carmony said.

Announce Hi-Y Officers

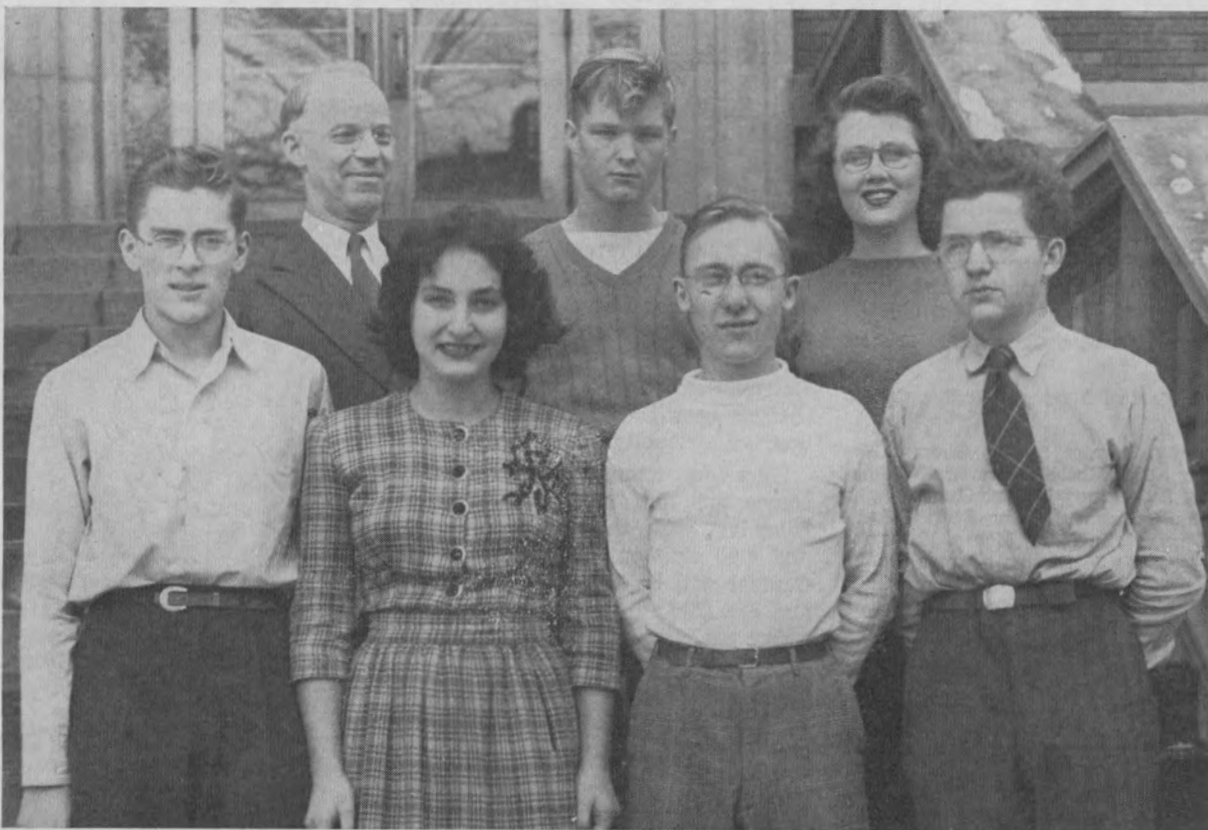

Mr. Robert Yoho, director of Health and Physical Education for the State Board of Health, will be in the county March 11 to March 15 for the purpose of appearing before each High School prior to the X-Ray survey of students in sports and all students in the 9th and 11th grades. Mr. Yoho is scheduled to speak at Central High School on March 13 at 8:30 a. m. He will speak on the need for physical fitness in peacetime and the importance of good health in successful living.

Mr. Yoho will stress the fact that the chest X-Ray is the only sure way of telling whether or not you have TB. The Tuberculin skin test tells if you have been in contact with the tuberculosis germ but the X Ray is the only way to tell whether the germ has been doing any damage to your lungs.

Following Mr. Yoho's talk the X-R Survey will take place in Central High School on April 3rd, 4th, 5th and 8th.

ELKHART FIRST OPPONENT OF BEARS AT ADAMS

CENTRAL DEFEATS TIGERS FOR SECTIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Coach John Wooden's Central Bears, winners of the sectional championship last Saturday night, will meet Coach John Longfellow's Blue Blazers of Elkhart in the John Adams gym next Saturday afternoon, March 2, to battle in the second game of the regionals contest for the trip to Lafayette.

The Blazers have come through their season so far as a most outstanding hardwood squad, advancing to the regionals by defeating the quintet from Bristol, 59-37. With the defeat of the New Carlisle Panthers by a score of 51-47, the Bears advanced to the regionals with Elkhart. The first game of the afternoon will be played between Winamac, who defeated Fulton in their sectional, and Culver, who defeated Bremen.

The winner of this game will play the winner of the Central - Elkhart game, to determine the winner of the regionals. This winner will then go to Lafayette to play in the semi-finals on Saturday, March 9.

Sectionals Prove Difficult

Last Thursday afternoon the Central Bears invaded the John Adams gymnasium and no local or county team was strong enough to put them out, so Saturday night they left of their own accord, as 1946 sectional champions.

The Lakeville boys were the first stubborn team the Bears encountered and they really had trouble with them. It was the sharp shooting of Bob Temple that kept the Bears in the game. Temple turned in a total of 10 points, but unfortunately he fouled out later in the game.

Lakeville took things in their own hands and at the intermission the Bears trailed 12-10. Central came back in the second period and held the lead until the final gun sounded, the score 30-26.

The Bears took the floor again later that evening against the John Adams Eagles and they appeared to be in much better shape for this contest Central gained the lead at once and kept it to the end. Several times the Eagles cut the margin down to just a couple points. Bob Adams hit the loop for 23 points and Eugene Ring got himself five field goals and two free throws for a total of 12 points. Bob Nitz was the big gun for Adams, getting 15 points. Central led the Eagles 29-19 at the half, and the final score was 48-41 in the Bears' favor.

The third big tough trial for the Central boys was a contest Saturday afternoon with the Washington Pan-

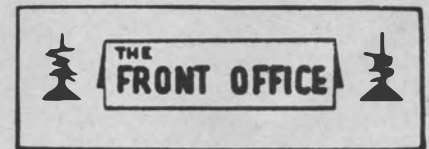

thesr. This was the semi-final. The Bears had all kinds of trouble before defeating the Panthers. The Bruins built up a nice 19-4 lead in the early part of the first frame. Adams, McCarthy, and Perkins kept busy banging away at the bucket, and in the meantime Fenimore, Robertson and Alexander were hitting for Washington. When the half time gun sounded the Panthers trailed by only 8 points.

The third quarter opened and the Bears were still sinking buckets right and left as Alexander kept putting them in for the Panthers, and narrowed the lead to one point, but they just couldn't seem to put enough into the game to overpower Central. When the final gun sounded it was another game to the Bears' credit by a score of 37-30.

Coach Wooden's boys hit pay-dirt Saturday evening when they knocked off the New Carlisle Tigers in a close 51-47 overtime thriller.

The two boys who really won the final game for the Bears were Gene Ring, who threw in 26 points and "Swede" Jensen, who hit the ring for seven points. It wasn't that "Swede" got many points, but it was WHEN he got them. The Tigers took the first period lead 14-11, but Central bounced back and at half-time led, 27-17. Ring hit three free throws and Temple connected with a field goal to put the Bears ahead 32-17. Carlisle started hitting and before anyone knew what was happening the third quarter gun went off and Central led only 38-36. The score was soon tied up at 40-40, then 41-41, 43-43, 45-45.

It was at this time that Jensen flipped in his one-hander from the side to tie the score.

As soon as the overtime started Jensen dumped in another to put the Bears ahead. Perkins and Temple tossed in a free throw apiece to cinch the game with a final score of 51-47.

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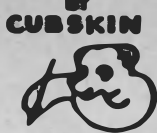


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BEAR FACTS
