The Jazz Concert given by Norman Granz's boys was a big success. A few of the names there were Coleman Hawkins (sax), Illinois Jagues (sax), Rex Stewart (trumpet), and Roy Eldredge (trumpet). The whole thing is a new experiment. For the first time Jazz is being presented in a dignified way in the concert hall. Granz has been giving these concerts around the country and using the proceeds to help stop racial discrimination. This is probably the greatest step taken by Jazz and one of the finest gestures made. Besides all of that these were some of the finest Jazz artists in the country.

Illinois Jacques broke the ice with a hot solo. Then Rex Stewart broke the place up with one of the finest trumpet solos I have ever heard. Illinois Jacques gave a great solo on the tune he made famous, "Flyin' Home." In the final number the whole band joined to play "O'jam Blues."

For some new records is Tommy Dorsey's "Gotta Get Me Someone to Love." On the flip over is "That's My Home." Dinah Shore comes back with an oldie from the 20's entitled "Who'll Buy My Violets." 
OPEN HOUSE

Many eyes are turned toward the Laporte-Michigan City tilt, which will be played the same night as the Central-North Side contest. Should Laporte be beaten, and the Bears win, then Central would become the eastern division Northern Indiana champion.
