# Seniors Lead Honor Roll; Girls Edge Boys By 97

The girls did it again! For the last nine weeks grading period they led the honor roll with 209 students to the boys' meek score of 112 and a grand total of 295 students for the entire school.

The senior class led the school with 89 honor roll students, the freshmen following with 75. Not far behind were the sophomores with 73 and last were the juniors with 83. The junior high had 28 students on the honor roll.

# MISS KNUDSON HEAD OF SPEECH THERAPY

The first speech correction classes in South Bend began at Central in 1937. At that time Miss Knudson was teaching Public Speaking here and she began her speech correction classes with a class of twenty-five students who stuttered. This group was also one of the first groups of its kind in the state of Indiana.

## All Schools Have Program

Since that time the program has grown, under the supervision of Miss Knudson, until every school in the city has a speech correction program. During the last semester Miss Knudson and seven therapists worked with well over nine hundred students.

Miss Knudson's work in the area of speech therapy was recognized recently when she attended a conference of the Kansas City International Council for Exceptional Children in the Municipal Auditorium in Kansas City. At that time she took part in a symposium on stuttering.

## U. of Iowa Is Destination

The topic for Miss Knudson's speech was "Trends in Stuttering as Seen in the Public Schools." Her speech was based upon research studies that she has made in the South Bend schools as well as therapy with many students who stutter.

When school is out in June Miss Knudson will travel to the state University of Iowa where she will participate in a workshop on stuttering therapy. She will attend as one of twenty persons in the United States to receive scholarships for the program.

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The third in a series of informational addresses to the Central Future Teachers Association was delivered during the last club period, April 15. Miss Janice Burrell, student teacher for Miss Spray and a senior at Ball State Teachers College, discussed her feelings about teaching with the club.

Miss Burrell described the Ball State campus, the variety of buildings, and the vast selection of courses offered. "Not only is Ball State a wonderful college in which to earn a teacher's degree, but it also has excellent music and home economic departments," she observed.

## Works at Morris School Also

In addition to the experience Miss Burrell is receiving in teaching English under the guidance of Miss Spray, she is also working with handicapped children at Morris School. "I would like very much to become a teacher of handicapped children and help them to learn to live with and make the best of their handicaps," she commented. Miss Burrell ended her lecture with a question and answer period for the benefit of PTA members.
