In addition, all traditional activities of the Student Council were continued and carried out in the Central High School fashion.




Audrey Hayes, now a member of the Junior Class executive board, was the Sophomore Class secretary. She is also a Student Council representative.

Teens for Fluoridatio

Why does South Bend not have fluoridated water? According to Dr. Herbert A. Schiller, president of the St. Joseph County Medical Association and instigator of the recent drive to bring fluoridation to South Bend, South Bend is ten years behind the times with respect to Fluoridation. He says that there are several reasons why South Bend does not have

The primary reason is that there is a lack of interest in fluoridation on the part of the citizens. Dr. Schiller says that the majority of people do not recognize the value of a water fluoridation program. He points out that fluoridation can cut cavities in children as much as two-thirds.

Another reason for non-acceptance of fluoridation in South Bend is that some people are misinformed about it. Some people consider fluoridation unconstitutional and socialized medicine. It has been declared constitutional by courts on the local, state, and national levels, and the American Medical Association has declared that it is not socialized medicine. Dr. Schiller urges everyone to demand proof for any statements made against fluoridation.

A third reason that South Bend does not have fluoridation, according to Dr. Schiller, is the twenty-five or thirty hard core anti-fluoridationists in the community. Many of those against fluordidation are misled, and

others are against it for personal gain or publicity. It is evident that the opposition to fluordidation in South Bend is much better organized than those people for it.

Dr. Schiller has taken steps to organize pro-fluordidationists by forming a committee called "Teenagers for Fluoridation." He believes that teenagers can be the most beneficial in bringing fluoridation to South Bend. Because young children receive the most benefit from fluoridation, teenagers that are soon to be married and have children should begin look forward to their families'
