this still-young season, make two trips this week as they try to improve on their record. Friday finds the Bears at Goshen where the Redskins, many of whom were seen at Central's win over Kokomo taking notes, attempt to find the magic formula to upset the Bears. The following night, Gary Roosevelt will entertain the Central team. The Panthers, possibly the best team in talent-rich Gary, used 14 men in their rout of previously unbeaten South Bend Washington December 11. The score was 89-72 on Washington's home floor. Gary has the reputation for unusual toughness on their court.
Last Saturday saw Central defeat Kokomo, 79-65, with a great second half effort that erased a three-point Kokomo lead at the half. Karl Simon tied the game early in the third quarter with three-point play, and from then on it was all Bears. Led by sensational Wade Fuller, the Bears opeend up with a 46-38 lead, and then reeled off 11 points in a row to take a 58-45 lead into the final quarter. In the fourth quarter, the Bears continued their dominance Leon Davis scored 10 of his teamhigh 28 in the last eight minutes, and grabbed an impressive num-
ball several times and once raced the length of the floor for his crowd-delighting "stuff shot."
