
Our candidates have gathered much experience in various activi-


and the present administration which is predominantly United Students.





This year Central High School is entering a safety contest sponsored by the South Bend Police Department for all of the city high schools, in co-ordination with the coming Safety Check Campaign. Each school will operate one or more check lanes, and will be judges upon the number of cars checked and the quality of work done by the particular school. Mickey Tuesley is the Central Student Chairman. Mr. Ed Szucs and Mr. Dorwin Nelson are the Faculty Advisors. Sarol Krueger is in charge of a booklet to summarize our treatment of the safety week. It will

contain pictures and committee reports showing Central students at work. Prizes totaling as high as \$1,000 will be given on the basis of the material in the presentation booklet.

Mickey Maros and Mr. Devon Phelps will photograph the events, and Sue Reuthe will head the Public Relations Committee. Working with her will be Jerry Vancik, Sandy Cohen, and Thom Hall. The Publicity Committee Chairman is Sharon Fabian, helping her will be Anne Boehm, Sandy Frank, and Helmut Haefke. 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
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Track And Baseball Are Underway!


BEAR FACTS CUBSKIN
