 SectionalsWhen all of the schools in the ectional cheer for Central's opponents, do not be alarmed. There
is a simple reason for their actions. Central in the past forty years of the South Bend Sectional has been champion 24 times. Add to this the six times it has been runnersup and one sees a clear domination of the tourney on Central's part. So complete is this domination, that the Bears have won three times as many crowns as the next team, Mishawaka. The Maroons have picked up seven championships, their last victory in 1955 when they had $6^{\prime} 6^{\prime \prime}$ Leroy Johnson. Close on the Maroons' heels are the Riley Wildcats, who have mobbed six crowns over the years. Their best years came during the thirties when they gained half of their championships. Riley has been waiting since 1952 to obtain a new sectional trophy for its school.
Only two other schools have more than one title to their name. Washington won their first as a new school in 1938 and then waited to 1965 to win a hotly contested game over Central. Adams also has two champion teams, the latest coming in 1958. The River Park school's first crown came 14 years earlier.
Though called the South Bend Sectional, several non-area teams have seen action in tournament. In fact, one year the St. Joseph county teams were not even represented when Nappanee defeated Goshen for the crown.

Besides dominating the winning statistics, the Bears hold many other records. Central's defense looked in top form when defeating North Liberty 33 to 5 to give the Shamrocks the all-time low scoring record in 1930. Bears' offense has been no pansy either. Last year they grabbed the scoring crown for final games by racking up 97 points against Washington. One year in a championship game they won by the unlikely low score of 24-12.
